## Eco-Schools and Waste Aid (2019-20) – a summary

The Charities Committee chose WasteAid as the school charity for 2019/20. The chosen charity benefits from the majority of fundraising by staff and students over the course of the year. It is usual for a local charity to be selected but the Charities Committee were very keen to support the work being done by the Eco-Committee. This was approved by SLT and Governors.

Although lockdown had a significant impact on fundraising opportunities the committee found creative ways of getting the whole school community involved in fundraising events, including many during lockdown. These included, sponsored walks as part of daily exercise and sculpture competitions with art work made from waste products. The Bulletin and Assembles were used to keep the school community updated on the progress during the year and to inform everyone of the work of WasteAid.

The school communicated with representatives from WasteAid throughout and worked with staff based in the UK as well as in Kenya. A high point was a one hour Zoom call with two WasteAid staff in Kenya and members of the Charities Committee and representatives from the Eco-Committee.

The total amount raised was £11,486. This will be used to support several key projects in Kenya, Uganda and Cameroon. A key project supported manufactures road tiles from recycled plastic bottles.

WasteAid is working with local partners in the coastal city of Douala, to build a plastic waste recycling centre and train 160 unemployed youths to transform plastic waste into useful products like paving tiles. Douala sits on the Cameroon estuary, where four rivers meet - carrying vast amounts of plastic waste down to the Atlantic Ocean. The estuary is an internationally important biodiversity hotspot with turtles, manatees and mangrove forest. We are aiming to capture a large amount of plastic that is on its way downriver to the ocean, and create employment opportunities in a very deprived neighbourhood of the city.
