How to get involved

Trips and Visits

Cultural enrichment activities are designed to broaden, expose, and provide opportunities to enhance a student's learning experience. These activities include trips such as plays, university visits, and foreign exchanges to France, Germany or Spain.

Other activities and clubs are community-related and help students to understand their impact on their world and the importance of helping others, while giving them a real sense of achievement.

Trips and Visits

We recognise the enormous benefit to students of educational visits. Every year hundreds of students at HGS benefit from the experience of off-site visits. Students have the opportunity

to be challenged intellectually, physically, socially, morally and culturally.

Enthusiastic Year 12 biologists have the opportunity to visit the Cranedale Centre, near Malton, to experience three days of ecology and fieldwork. Their investigations are designed to complement the AQA Biology specification and activities include fresh water sampling, the effect of desiccation on a rocky sea shore and using techniques to estimate the size of a motile population.

Such experiences abroad help to bring the classroom learning to life and increase cultural awareness, hopefully fuelling interest and ambition for future adventures with the languages that they study.

German Trip (Year 8 & 9)



The aim of the visit is both cultural and for the language. Our trip will include a variety of activities giving students the opportunity to experience German culture whilst also improving their language skills. We will be visiting Cochem Castle, Cologne including the Cathedral, and experience a river cruise along the Rhine. We will also take part in a town trail in Boppard and spend a day at 'Phantasialand', a well-known theme park.



The sites chosen will enrich and enhance students' understanding of the human environment and physical processes, and the interactions between them. Students will visit key sites such as Herculaneum, Pompeii, Mount Vesuvius, Sorrento and The Amalfi Coast.

We collaborate together and have rehearsals through out the day, interspersed with team building experiences and workshops. This culminates in a performance of what we have achieved at the end. History Trip (Year 8) (\$\frac{1}{3}\$)



This is a four-day residential trip to the Ypres salient in Belgium. During the trip, students will visit cemeteries, museums, battlefields and key sites of the First World War as well as the grave of an HGS student awarded the Victoria Cross for bravery during the war. Students will have free time in the town of Ypres before crossing back to the UK on an overnight ferry. This rewarding trip allows Year 8 students to consolidate their learning on the First World War and explore the impact that this conflict had on Europe.



History Trip (Year 10) (S



Year 10 historians will visit Durham Cathedral as part of their work on Norman England. Students will tour the cathedral to gain a deeper understanding of its significance in the Norman Conquest of England and how it fits into Norman reforms to the Church.

History Trip (Year 11)



Pear 11 historians visit the Thackray Medical Museum in Leeds for a revision day enriching their understanding of the study of medicine through time, with a particular focus on the industrial and modern periods, through the artefacts held by the museum.

Humanities Trip (Year 7) (§



Year 7 students will visit York in a trip that compliments area of the curriculum that have been studied through the year and helps in their studies in forthcoming academic years. This trip includes undertaking fieldwork related to their study of flooding in Geography; a visit to Clifford's Tower to consolidate their work on the Middle Ages in History and a tour of York Minster, allowing students to apply their knowledge of Christianity from RS to the magnificent Minster.



Outward Bound Trip (Year 9) (§



Year 9 students are offered the opportunity to take part in an optional outdoor residential trip. This experience is a chance to mark the end of Key Stage 3, to act as preparation for Key Stage 4 and to live out one of our core values "Adventure". The students will take part in the Outward Bound's Adventure and Challenge programme. Challenges include gorge scrambling, rock climbing, mountain walking, canoeing, raft building and cutter sailing. All are fun, adventurous and help to build confidence and develop friendships.

Students engage in an activity for an hour a week for each of the sections for a set period of time (see graphics below). As part of the award, students will take part in a walking expedition. This is a two-day expedition in Wensleydale and Nidderdale at Bronze and a four-day expedition in The Howgill Fells and Dales at Gold. All kit can be borrowed except walking boots, sleeping bag and a waterproof jacket.

You will enjoy loads of new experiences, get fitter, challenge yourself and discover talents you never thought you had. In conclusion, the Duke of Edinburgh award is a life changing, community engaging, skill building experience.



Sixth Form Service Job Roles



Showing commitment and respect to the school community and beyond are values that we promote strongly at Harrogate Grammar School. To promote this, all Year 12 students are required to complete 30 hours Service over the course of the year. This Service involves students undertaking a voluntary role either in or out of school. The purpose of Service is to give our Sixth Form students responsibility for supporting others, to develop



communication skills, to forge a strong sense of community, and to give younger students some visible role models around school. It also develops the time management skills of our Year 12s, as they balance their different commitments and it builds communication and leadership skills that are valued by employers and universities.

Reading Mentor

Reading Mentors work in partnership with the Sixth Form Team and teaching staff, supporting and enhancing the education of students in the school, particularly in aiding reading ability, and developing reading confident. Reading Mentors work with staff in and around school, assist with events and undertake one session of reading with other students once a week. Reading Mentors are role models for younger students and as such, are expected to demonstrate maturity, show good judgement, be reliable and act responsibly. at all times.

Peer Mentor

Peer Mentors work in partnership with the Sixth Form Team and teaching staff, supporting and enhancing the education of students in the school. In carrying out these duties, Peer Mentors are representing the school and have the support of the Headteacher and all other HGS staff. Peer Mentors are role models for younger students thus must demonstrate maturity, show good judgement, be reliable and act responsibly at all times.

Prefecting Roles

The role of Sixth Form Prefect is one of significant responsibility. Prefects work in partnership with the Sixth Form Team and teaching staff, supporting and enhancing the education of students in the school and assisting with administration and supervision. Prefects support staff in and around school, undertake a lunchtime and break duty once a week, and assist with special occasions and events. Prefects are role models for younger students and as such, are expected to demonstrate maturity, show good judgement, be reliable and act responsibly at all times.

Prefecting Role-Performing Arts Faculty (Drama and/or Music)

Prefects are students who are actively involved in extra-curricular activities in the Performing Arts Faculty. Typically, the Prefect takes on a leadership role, which includes engaging with student voice and the creation of school productions. Prefects are often called upon to discuss Performing Arts Faculty challenges and contribute to the life of the faculty. Prefects often support in practical lessons allowing younger students to benefit from their experience.

School Council





Each form elects two representatives to form their Year Council. Representatives bring items to each meeting and share findings with their forms. Each meeting is run by the Year Manager with the help of members of the Student Leadership Team.

Senate





Students volunteer to represent their year group at Senate, and then this goes to a vote with the rest of the year group. The Senate meets after each Year Council meeting to discuss issues raised by each year group, as well as an SLT agenda item. These are then discussed and action points are drawn up. Minutes are presented to the SLT and a summary of the meeting is written for the Bulletin. The meetings are run by the two head students.
