Seven Steps





Summer Two

- Prepare for your Green Flag Assessor visit, gather the evidence needed for your assessment and think about what you want to show and tell your assessor.
- · Celebrate achieving your Green Flag Award.
- Consider the Eco-Schools topics you want to work on for your next Green Flag Award.

Autumn One

- Tell your school about your Eco-Schools plan in a whole-school assembly.
- Elect a new Eco-Committee, or expand your existing one.
- Complete the Eco-Schools Environmental Review.
- Tell your school about the findings of the Environmental Review

Autumn Two

- Complete your Action Plan by deciding on three Eco-Schools topics to work on (five for Green Flag renewals).
- Think about how you are going to monitor your actions, as you may need to gather data at this point.
- Tell your whole school about your Action Plan.
- Apply for your self-assessed Bronze Award.

Eco-Year

Summer One

- Begin evaluating whether your Action Plan has been a success.
- Gather together the evidence needed for your Green Flag application.
- Apply for your Green Flag assessment online.

Spring Two


- Update your school on the progress of your Eco-Schools application.
- Monitor if your actions are working and if not make adjustments.
- · Apply for your self-assessed Silver Award.

Spring One

- Begin working on the actions in your Action Plan (if you haven't already).
- Begin to gather examples of curriculum eco-work that your school has or is going to complete.
- Make sure your Eco-Board is up to date.

Eco-Committee





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Green Flag Criteria Checklist

- At least one student from each year group is on your Eco-Committee.
- Eco-Committee meets at least once every half-term.
- Studentss share responsibility with adults for running meetings and keeping a record of meetings.
- Meeting minutes are displayed on your Eco-Board.
- There is representation from parents, governors or senior management on the Eco-Committee (they do not have to attend each Committee Meeting, but should be kept up-to-date).



Environmental Review



- The current Eco-Schools Environmental Review is completed by students.
- A copy of the Environmental Review is displayed on the Eco-Board.



Action Plan



- Your Eco-Committee produces an Action Plan influenced by their Eco-Schools Environmental Review.
- Action Plan contains actions for three topics (first Green Flag) or five topics (Green Flag renewals).



- Your Action Plan contains timescales, who is responsible and how the actions will be monitored and evaluated.
- A copy of the Action Plan is displayed on your Eco-Board.



Curriculum Links



You have gathered evidence that shows environmental issues have been covered in at least three areas of your school's curriculum. This evidence if from different year groups and subject areas.



Informing and Involving



- You have a prominent, designated and up-to-date Eco-Board that includes:
 - O Eco-Committee members and corresponding year group.
 - O Meeting Minutes
 - O A copy of your Environmental Review
 - A copy of your Action Plan
 - Examples of Monitoring and Evaluation
 - O Your Eco-Code
- Your Eco-Committee has used a variety of mediums to communicate their topic actions.
- Your whole school and its wider community has been involved in Eco-Schools work.

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Monitoring and Evaluation



- Your Eco-Committee have monitored the effectiveness of their topic actions in a variety of ways including at least one way that links to the curriculum.
- Evidence of Monitoring and Evaluation for each topic action is displayed on your Eco-Board.







- Eco-Code has been created by students.
- Eco-Code reflects the topics you have worked on in your Action Plan.
- Your Eco-Code is displayed on your Eco-Board.
- Your Eco-Code is displayed throughout the school and known and understood by the majority of students and staff.





Green Flag Assessment

Once you have worked through the Eco-Schools Seven Steps it is time to apply for an international, Eco-Schools Green Flag award, which you can do by logging in to your Eco-Schools account. It should take no longer than **thirty minutes to complete**.

The online Green Flag application asks for:

- 3 brief examples of the curriculum work your school has completed linked to **any** of our ten topics
- A **brief** description of how you have monitored and communicated your topic actions
- Tick boxes and simple questions relating to your Eco-Schools topic actions.
- As well as completing a Green Flag application, you will also be asked to submit the following documents (please read Uploading Evidence below before completing your Green Flag application):
 - Your completed Environmental Review
 - Your Action Plan
 - A **clear** photograph of your Eco-Board.

Finally, you will also need to select dates when your school is available to be assessed – Eco-Schools relies on volunteer assessors, so we recommend choosing as many dates as possible. Before we assign an assessor to your school, we will double check that your school is still available on the date the assessor has chosen.

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Allocation of initial responsibilities

- **1.** Eco-coordinator send letters to parents and Governors/PTA to seek support and invitation to be involved.
- 2. Carry our **Environmental Review** link with Mr. Renton, Mr. Howell, Mr. Mungovin and Ms. Smith.
- 3. Set-up and up-date **Eco-board** link with Ms. Smith and Eco-coordinator.
- **4. Fundraising** explore Eco-schools fundraising ideas (contact Harrogate Water) liaise with Ms. Smith and Eco-coordinator.
- **5.** Curriculum links find out which environmental topics are already covered by subjects as part of their curriculum link with Ms. Smith.
- **6. Assembly** and **Bulletin item** to introduce Eco-schools and share results of Environmental Review.
- 7. Action plan ideas initial research.
