The Learning Agreement

The following pages set out the specific standards and expectations of students in the Sixth Form at Harrogate Grammar School. Links to key policy documents are included to ensure that every student and parent / carer has a clear understanding of these expectations. By completing the required Admission Form and Learning Agreement prior to enrolment, all students and parents / carers are committing to supporting and meeting the standards set out in the Handbook and school policies.

Attendance and Punctuality

Establishing strong habits and routines is essential to successful Sixth Form study. We have high expectations that students will come to school every day and on time. Students should aim for 100% attendance, as those with the best attendance make the most progress and have a much better chance of achieving their potential.

The Sixth Form reception is open for students to enter from 7.45am and the day starts at 8.50am with registration in form groups. Students are expected to attend all timetabled lessons and study periods on time to maximise their learning.

Attendance to school and to each timetabled lesson is monitored closely. Whilst we understand there may be some individual circumstances which may be out of your control, we ask that students and parents work with us to ensure attendance is as high as possible.

Authorised Absences include:

- An absence for sickness for which the school has granted leave
- Medical or dental appointments which unavoidably fall during school time, for which the school has granted leave
- Religious or cultural observances for which the school has granted leave
- An absence due to a family emergency
- Pre-approved university open day visits and university / apprenticeship interviews
- Pre-approved driving test

Permission must be requested in advance, by parent/carer, via email to Mrs Reed reedt@hgs.rklt.co.uk.

Unauthorised Absences include:

- Parents keeping children off school unnecessarily or without reason
- Truancy before or during the school day
- School or lesson absences which have never been properly explained
- Holidays
- Driving lessons



Communicating illness or making an absence request

- If a student has a genuine reason for absence, parents / carers must inform the Attendance Officer before 9am on each day of absence via the **Arbor App**, detailing the reason for absence. If you are unable to log absence via the arbor app please email reedt@hgs.rklt.co.uk.
- Students may be asked to provide medical evidence in certain circumstances
- Non-emergency dental / doctor appointments and driving lessons should not be arranged during the school day

If attendance to school and/or lesson falls below 95%, the Sixth Form Team will put measures in place to follow-up with students and parents / carers. This follow-up will include support to promote full attendance, home visits, referrals to outside agencies. Persistent absence may lead to discussions around a student's suitability for sixth form study including completion of courses, exam entries and future study options.

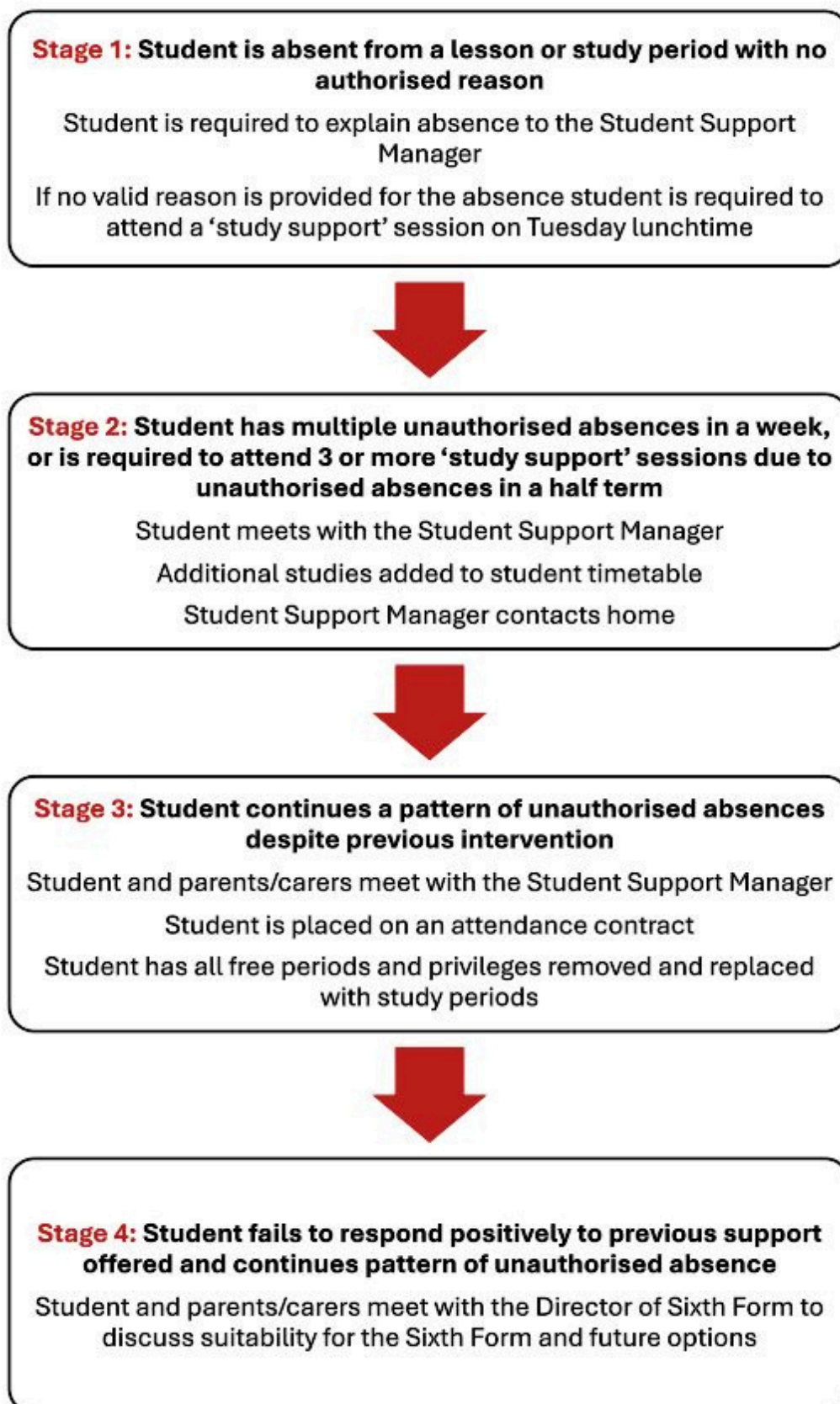
The Privilege System

Students with excellent levels of attendance and punctuality in Year 12 will be granted privileges in Year 13, including the privilege to arrive in school for their first timetabled lesson or study period of the day. This is a privilege that is earned in Year 12 and will only be granted if attendance and punctuality remain at a high level throughout the year.

These privileges are reviewed regularly, and will be removed if attendance and punctuality does not meet the expectations set.

Study Expectations

EXCELLENT LEARNER HABITS

Students in the Sixth Form at HGS work hard, and have chosen to attend a post-16 setting with high expectations of their learning.

Every half term, subject teachers will report on Students Learner Habits, which are assessed in the context of:

- Arrive with the correct equipment
- Listen with full attention
- Ask and answer questions
- Stay on task
- Produce your best work and check it
- Act on feedback
- Work well with others
- Meet home learning deadlines

These Learner Habits are monitored closely by the Sixth Form Team to ensure that every student maximises their learning.



HOME LEARNING, INDEPENDENT STUDY AND DEADLINES

By attending the Sixth Form at Harrogate Grammar School, students have chosen to attend a high achieving Sixth Form, with high expectations of student study habits. We expect that students achieve a high level of academic productivity both in and out of school. To support students in maintaining effective study routines we explicitly teach study skills, timetable silent and supervised study periods for every student, and monitor work completion and deadlines closely.

All Sixth Form students are expected to undertake **a minimum of 5 hours independent work outside the classroom, per subject, per week**. Students will be set home learning tasks by subject teachers on a weekly basis, and these tasks will be visible to students and parents / carers through the Arbor app. These tasks have a set deadline by which they must be completed, either by uploading work to the Showbie app or by bringing the work to the identified lesson.

A structured programme of independent study and revision activities is accessible for each subject via the Showbie app. Study tasks focus on building strong habits through addressing four modes of study:

Securing – learning the key vocabulary/terminology and essential facts/rules of a subject that underpin a topic or unit of work. These can be seen as the initial building blocks or component parts of a topic.

Processing – engaging in lots of practise or processing and transforming information requires further thinking and repetition and aids transfer into long-term memory.

Exploring – accessing additional relevant subject material, whether written, audio or audio-visual, helps students to place the knowledge they've learnt in a wider context and also to follow their own lines of interest which can inspire.

Reviewing – self-evaluation involves learners checking which knowledge is secure and embedded and which is not. It exposes any learning gaps so that they can be addressed through an action plan.

ASSESSMENT

Maintaining high levels of academic productivity throughout the two years in sixth form is essential to maintaining progress in line with statistical targets. The Sixth Form Team will monitor student progress very carefully to ensure that all students achieve their full potential. Click on the link for more information about **progress monitoring**.

Student progress is measured through ongoing in-class assessment, in-school Common Assessed Tasks, and national exams. The grades achieved in subject based Common Assessed Tasks are reported regularly, along with a Learner Habits Grade for each subject studied.

EXAMINATIONS

All students will be issued with guidance regarding examination procedures and an individual timetable will be emailed to each student. The school pays all examination entry fees, with the exception of re-sits. PLAGIARISM and AI

All work produced by students must be entirely their own. Plagiarism involves taking someone else's words, thoughts or ideas and trying to pass them off as your own. This includes downloading and submitting work taken from the internet, or work that has been produced with the use of AI. These are forms of cheating which are taken very seriously. Plagiarism and the reliance on AI within externally assessed coursework, controlled tasks, portfolios or exams may result in automatic disqualification. 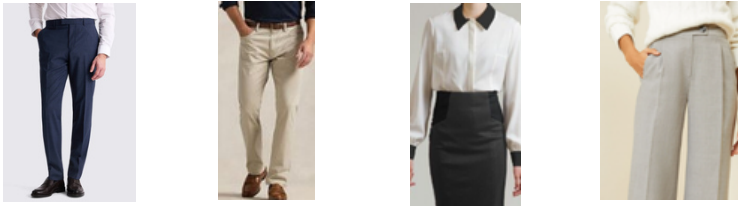
Sixth Form Dress Code

Our Sixth Form students are required to dress smartly, in keeping with the standards of the whole school. As the most senior students, our Sixth Form students act as representatives of the school within our local community and as role models for younger students within school and therefore are expected to dress in a professional manner. The post-16 dress code is both practical and smart but also allows students a degree of personal choice which is appropriate for students in a post-16 setting.

The principles that underpin our dress code are:

- **Equality:** all students are treated equally, regardless of gender and other characteristics.
- **Clarity:** the dress code is clear and simple to avoid doubt or misinterpretation.
- **Professionalism:** student dress reflects the formal setting of the school and is in keeping with the standards of uniform in the lower school and staff dress. It also reflects the standards of dress in professional working life.
- **Identity:** by wearing photo ID with year group lanyard at all times, Sixth Form students are identifiable as important members of our school community. This is also a requirement of the schools safeguarding policy.

By joining Sixth Form at Harrogate Grammar School, all students are agreeing to follow our dress code:

Plain, smart woollen jumper or cardigan, or suit jacket / blazer	
Smart long or short sleeved shirt, or smart blouse with collar	
Smart trousers or skirt	
Smart leather shoes	
Lanyard with ID visible, worn around the neck. Lanyards must be worn at all times throughout school. Lost lanyards will need to be replaced at a cost of £5.	

Sixth Form Dress Code

For clarification, the following items do not fall under the post-16 dress code and therefore are not permitted in school:

- Jeans, tracksuit bottoms, cargo pants, leggings or yoga pants, shorts
- Clothing with large images / lettering / logos
- Hoodies or sweatshirts
- T-shirts, polo shirts or casual tops
- Cropped tops or vest tops
- Sportswear (unless it is branded Sports Academy kit which can be worn on specified days)
- Trainers or Ugg-style footwear

We expect that all students will adhere to the standards set out in the dress code. If a student does not meet these expectations, they will first be spoken to by a member of the Sixth Form Team who will reiterate the principles that underpin the dress code and clarify the expectations. If a student persistently fails to follow the dress code, despite polite reminders, the Sixth Form Team will take appropriate action to ensure that the expectations are understood and met.



Standards and Behaviours

RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS AND BEHAVIOUR

Positive, respectful, caring relationships and good self-regulation are at the heart of a safe and productive learning environment. They underpin effective teaching and learning. Helping everyone in our community to work together means we can develop and sustain positive working relationships.

As the oldest students in the school, Sixth Form students at Harrogate Grammar School are expected to act as role models to younger students within school by demonstrating the school values and conducting themselves in a mature manner. We expect students to display the REACH values at all times, especially when travelling to and from school, at break and lunch times, and when on school visits.

Bullying

The school does not tolerate any bullying or harassment of any kind. Please refer to our **Bullying and Harassment policy**. Form tutors and Student Support Managers are the first point of contact if students or parents / carers have any concerns about bully or harassment. Students can also report instances of such behaviour via the Reach Out app.

Mobile phones and earphones

Sixth form students are allowed to use their phones and earphones at agreed times in communal Sixth Form spaces only. They are not permitted to be used outside the Sixth Form area. If a Sixth Form student is found with their mobile phone or earphones in the main school, this will be confiscated and kept safe for the remainder of the day in reflection.

Smoking / vaping, drugs & alcohol

Students must not be in possession of, or use, or attempt to sell or procure tobacco, alcohol or other drugs whilst on the school premises. This applies from the point they leave home to come to school to the point they arrive home after the school day. The school does not tolerate any student under the influence of, or the possession of drugs or alcohol. It is illegal for any person to smoke tobacco products or e-cigarettes on the school site. For further details, please read the school **Substance Use and Misuse policy**.

Students are also prohibited from smoking or vaping on nearby residential streets. Any student who is caught smoking in close vicinity of the school i.e. Arthurs Avenue, will lose the right to leave school at break and lunch time. Parental contact will also be made.

Powers to search and confiscate

Authorised staff have a statutory power to search students or their possessions, with or without consent, where they have reasonable grounds for suspecting that the student may have a prohibited item.

These are statutory powers and are used to ensure that all students are kept safe. For further details please see the **Searching and Confiscation policy**.

DRIVING AND VEHICLES

All driving lessons must be arranged outside of school hours, and lessons should start and finish at home and not school. If students live within walking distance to school, for reasons of safety, sustainability and health, they should leave their cars at home. Students who choose to drive to school must submit their vehicle details to Mrs Harriss at harrissr@hgs.rklt.co.uk.

The school car park is for Staff Permit Holders only and the school cannot allow student vehicles on the site. For safety reasons, no vehicles should enter the school car park to drop off or pick up students.

Parking on residential streets is subject to major restrictions and the school accepts no responsibility for these vehicles. Police and Parking Attendants regularly monitor the local area and will issue fines for illegal parking. The streets where parking is not permitted include Cundall Way, Southway, Grasmere Crescent and Rossett Way as verified by the Police, this list can be found on the main entrance doors of Sixth Form.

When parking in permitted areas on roads outside of school, students must take care to park carefully, and must avoid creating an obstruction for local residents and pedestrians.

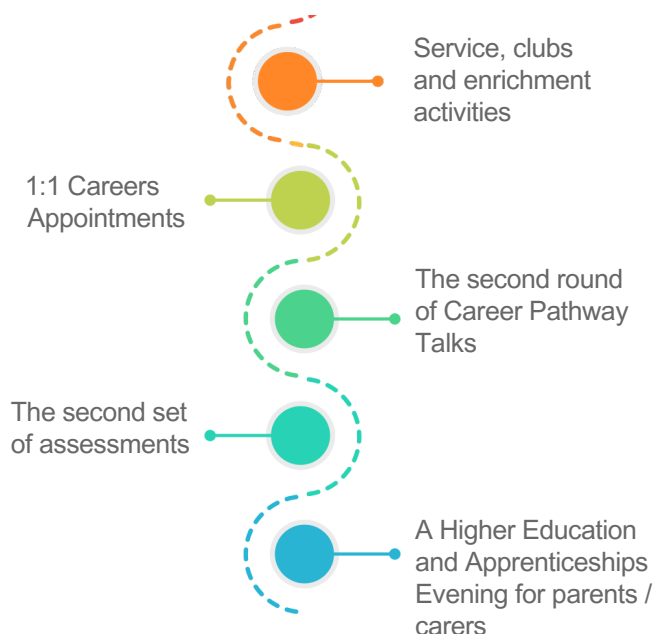

Practical Information

ROUTINES

Year 12 register with their Form Tutor at 8.50am each day, and if agreed by parents / carers, they can leave school in the afternoon when they have no further timetabled lessons or study periods. Students can leave the school grounds at break and lunch time, but they must return at the start of the next period, regardless of whether they have a timetable lesson or not.

Their timetable will consist of:

- Morning registration
- Progression
- Subject lessons
- Study periods

Year 13 students who have earned the privilege will be able to arrive in school in time for their first timetabled lesson / study period of the day, and leave after their final lesson / study period of the day.

Practical Information

PART-TIME WORK

This should be kept to a minimum, and **should never exceed 12 hours per week**. If students exceed this limit they are likely to put their results in jeopardy. The Sixth Form programme is very busy and students will soon find themselves fully occupied and struggling with deadlines should they fail to devote the appropriate time to their studies.

iPADS FOR LEARNING

We are extremely proud of our innovative use of technology to enhance the teaching and learning experience. We run the iPad scheme:

- To prepare students for working and living in a digital age
- To support self-led research and problem solving
- To improve the quality of feedback, home learning and collaboration
- To provide new and innovative ways for students to learn
- To ensure the safe use of mobile technology for learning

We recommend you have a stylus pen to use with your iPad, that has tilt sensitivity and palm keychain features.

The KXT Stylus for Apple iPad (2018-2023) costs around £20 and is used by staff in school.

PRINTING & PHOTOCOPYING

We encourage all students and staff to keep printing and photocopying to a minimum. Students should use their iPad to help them in achieving this.

There are two printer/photocopiers in the Sixth Form for students to use. Each student is provided with initial printing credits at the start of the academic year. Students who go beyond their credit must pay for their own printing / photocopying.

CATERING

Food and drink can be purchased throughout the day in G2. The school runs a cashless system for catering which should be topped up using the **online payment system**. Students will be issued a PIN at the start of Year 12 for this purpose. Students can also pay using a debit / credit card or ApplePay.



APPS AND WEBSITES

Our core apps allow parents/carers and students to access real time information regarding home learning, attendance and rewards and sanctions. More information can be found on [our website](#).

Arbor



The Arbor Student app allows students to access their timetable and also their homework, which will be accompanied by a description and deadlines set by their teachers.

The Arbor Parent app provides a convenient way for parents/carers to access, review and request changes to the data we hold on our system. The app can also be used to view attendance records, check what homework has been set/completed or outstanding, view student timetables, top up meal accounts, pay for trips, and sign up for extra-curricular clubs.

Showbie

Students can access Showbie as an app on their iPad. Teachers share resources for lessons and home learning through 'classes' they create on Showbie.



Unifrog



Unifrog is used to support students in exploring opportunities beyond the Sixth Form, including university courses, apprenticeships and gap years. All students and parent / carers are issued with a login to access this platform to research next steps, undertake personality and skills quizzes, document work experience, and write personal statements and CVs.

Personal Development and Careers

THE PROGRESSION PROGRAMME

Students in the Sixth Form follow a Personal Development programme called 'Progression' which incorporates key elements of careers education and support as well as elements of Personal, Social, Health Education (PSHE) and Relationships and Sex Education (RSE). This programme is carefully constructed to focus on advice and issues that directly affect Sixth Form students, and is delivered by the Form Tutor and members of the Sixth Form Team. These lessons take place every Tuesday in period 4, and are incorporated in the student timetable.

CAREERS ADVICE AND GUIDANCE

All students are supported in choosing their path beyond the Sixth Form by experienced members of staff and through the use of the Unifrog platform. In addition, a programme of careers events runs throughout the year.

This includes:

- Guest speakers from a variety of employment sectors and HE institutions
- Career Pathway talks from leading professionals
- Visits to universities, apprenticeships, and work placements
- University and employment interview training and experiences
- Volunteering opportunities
- Careers fair
- Medics, Dentistry and Vets interview conference
- Oxbridge interview conference
- Apprenticeship interview conference

Enrichment

SERVICE

All students in Year 12 are expected to undertake 30 hours of voluntary service throughout the year. This involves a weekly commitment, either in school or out of school, supporting others. At the start of the year students select from a range of voluntary opportunities, from supporting in Key Stage 3 subject lessons, to providing technical expertise for school productions and events. This fosters a close link between our Sixth Form students and the rest of the school community, and it develops the communication and teamwork skills of our year 12s, while giving them some leadership opportunities which will serve them well beyond school. LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Developing the leadership skills of our students is a priority at HGS, and we have a range of opportunities for students to take on a variety of roles within school. These include supporting and leading clubs, societies and events across the whole school, representing students as a member of the Year Council, leading Sixth Form societies and social activities, and representing the whole student body as one of our Head Students. SOCIETIES AND EXTRA CURRICULAR

A large number of by-student, for-student societies run annually within the Sixth Form. These are entirely student led, and they play a key role in adding to the vibrant atmosphere in our Sixth Form. A 'Freshers Fair' is held in September where students can launch and promote their own society, and sign up to join societies run by others.

A wide range of extra-curricular activities are available for students in the Sixth Form, including sports, music, drama, debating. **Extra-curricular** contains details of the opportunities for students to get involved in.

SPORTS ACADEMY

The core purpose of the **Sports Academy** is to provide the best possible environment to achieve your sporting ambitions alongside achieving academic excellence.

Students attend a timetabled programme of rugby or netball training sessions during the school day as well as strength and conditioning sessions in the mornings, led by highly experienced sports coaches and teachers.

Students in the rugby and netball teams play competitive fixtures against schools both regionally and nationally.



BAR MOCK TRIAL

The Bar Mock Trial competition is a regional and national competition in which school teams prepare for and enact a legal case. All students have the opportunity to join our Sixth Form team to learn about how legal cases operate and how the justice system works. This is a fantastic opportunity for anyone interested in studying law, those interested in the justice system, or anyone who wants to develop public speaking skills.

GOLD DUKE OF EDINBURGH

Students have the opportunity to achieve the Gold Award during their time in the Sixth Form. The scheme includes expeditions in the Yorkshire Dales, Service and Skills components, and helps to foster teamwork and leadership skills.

ENCORE!

Encore! is the name of the instrumental and vocal music teaching provision at Harrogate Grammar School. It has been especially designed to provide an easy transition for all students to continue with or start instrumental and/or vocal lessons from primary school upwards. MENTAL HEALTH & WELLBEING

The wellbeing of all members of the HGS community is supported through:

The school partners with the Harrogate Cluster Support Team, who offer emotional wellbeing and trauma support through a school counsellor and wellbeing worker. We also have dedicated Sixth Form Student Support Managers.

SEND (SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS & DISABILITIES) & LEARNING SUPPORT

The Sixth Form is committed to ensuring success for all our young people who have additional needs.

Through carefully tailored and closely monitored provision, we aim to support and enhance the inspirational teaching and learning to ensure 'Excellence for All.'

Staff are made aware of individual student needs and provide inclusive teaching with adjustments when and where needed.

The Learning Support Faculty is responsible for ensuring that additional needs are identified as early as possible so that appropriate assessment, advice and provision can be implemented. The impact of any intervention is carefully monitored and kept under review whilst the full involvement of young people and their families is at the heart of everything we do.

The Learning Mentor, based in the Sixth Form, is dedicated to supporting students with special educational needs.

BURSARY

Students suffering financial hardship are encouraged to speak to Mrs Reed to discuss the possibility of applying for an appropriate bursary. The 16 – 19 Bursary Fund is intended for students who are in most need of financial support. The funds are intended to assist with expenditure that is directly related to school life.

LANYARDS

It is a safeguarding requirement for all Sixth Form students to visibly wear their student identification (ID) lanyard. This is essential as Sixth Form students do not wear a school uniform and need to be recognisable to main school students and staff. Sixth Form Students can only enter and exit Sixth Form via Sixth Form Reception with their lanyards which operates the keypad. All students will be issued with their own student ID lanyard and will be responsible for its safe keeping. Replacement ID will incur a charge of £5. For safeguarding and security reasons, students must not bring external visitors on to the school site.

CEOP

CEOP helps any child or young person under the age of 18 who is being pressured, forced or tricked into taking part in sexual activity of any kind. This can be something that has taken place either online or in 'the real world', or both.
