

## **End of Academic Year Message – Summer 2023**

As we approach the new academic year, we want to take this opportunity to not only wish you a pleasant summer break but also update you about some developments next year.

This year, 44 trips took place involving 3,600 students. There were 95 regular clubs and we played 300 sporting fixtures. In performing arts, over 900 students took part in a school play, concert, gig, theatre visit or workshop. Year 7 enjoyed free taster lessons across a range of instruments and 156 students took part in the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme. A total of 49,714 excellent learner habits have been awarded this year. There were 24 house events, including walk to school and foodbank collections.



In May, we wished our Year 11 and Year 13 all the very best in their final examinations – Year 13 were the cohort who received Teacher Assessed Grades in the Summer of 2021. This year we delivered over 40 pre-examination technique sessions to support them before they sat examinations for the first time. We would like to acknowledge the excellent conduct of all of our students who have taken external exams this year and hope their hard work is rewarded on the results days in the summer.

OFQUAL have stated that they 'are expecting results in 2023 to be similar to those in pre-pandemic years.' As a post-pandemic measure, they have introduced grading protection for GCSE and A level students, meaning that a student 'who would have achieved an A before the pandemic should be just as likely to do so in 2023, even if the quality of their work is a little weaker.'

# **School Priorities next year**

Next year we will continue our focus on returning attendance to pre-pandemic levels across the school. Whilst our data is above the national average, we know that regular attendance makes such a difference, and we want to achieve our ambitious target of 97 per cent.

Across a teaching body of 115 teachers, we have been working on using a standard language around classroom expectations and instructions, so that all our students are clear on what we expect from them and so that we can maximise our instruction time.

In addition, next year, we will continue to embed sustainability initiatives and students will see more recycling bins across the school.

In June this year, we carried out a computer-desktop free trial where teachers delivered lessons for the day through their iPad. We will carry out further test days next term, before potentially removing the desktop computers as a means to enhance teaching and create both energy and financial savings.

In September, we will start the term with key assemblies that welcome students back to school and stress key points about our values, expectations, learner habits and how/who students should reach out to if they need support in school.

## **Flexible Working Ambassador**

The school has been successful in its bid this year to be a lead school in a government initiative to improve flexible working and lead culture change in the education sector. The initiative involves the school acting as an ambassador and working with partner schools to improve flexible working. This is part of a government strategy to tackle teacher recruitment and retention.

### Summer building projects

Due to the funding pressures in schools, we have a limited number of projects taking place over the summer to enhance the overall school environment:

- Redecoration and reconfiguration of the Hub, our main dining room
- Installing a marquee cover for Sustain so we can open this dining space all year round

- Returning two offices to classroom spaces in the Sixth Form

## **Catering Costs**



Our school hot meal deal remained the same for many years before we increased the cost last year from £2.90 to £3.20. Unfortunately, the pressure of food costs remains, and we need to increase our prices in September from the current £3.20 to £3.50. The price of individual menu items will also increase, and we will share a full price list in September.

#### **Ties**

In September, students will wear the new tie designs. Each year group will wear this design of tie as they progress through the school until the end of Year 11, meaning you will no longer need to purchase new ties in Year 10 and Year 11. We hope this reduces waste by only needing to buy one tie.


We also look forward to new staff joining us in September, including Mr Hill, a former student at HGS, who returns as our new Assistant Headteacher – Director of Maths.
