How to get involved

Trips and Visits

Cultural enrichment activities are designed to broaden, expose, and provide opportunities to enhance a student's learning experience. These activities include trips such as plays, university visits, and foreign exchanges to France, Germany or Spain.

Other activities and clubs are community-related and help students to understand their impact on their world and the importance of helping others, while giving them a real sense of achievement.

Trips and Visits

We recognise the enormous benefit to students of educational visits. Every year hundreds of students at HGS benefit from the experience of off-site visits. Students have the opportunity to be challenged intellectually, physically, socially, morally and culturally.

Apprenticeship University Visit (2)





In the Autumn term Year 12 students have the opportunity to attend a university or apprenticeship visit.

Biology Trip (Year 12) (§ § §





Enthusiastic Year 12 biologists have the opportunity to visit the Cranedale Centre, near Malton, to experience three days of ecology and fieldwork. Their investigations are designed to complement the AQA Biology specification and activities include fresh water sampling, the effect of desiccation on a rocky sea shore and using techniques to estimate the size of a motile population.

Business Studies Disneyland Trip (Year 12) (2)






An annual trip to a ski resort in Europe. This trip usually lasts one week during the February half term or Easter half term holidays. Beginners and more advanced skiers are all welcome.



French Exchange







We offer biennial, week-long exchange programmes to our partner school in Armentières (France)

Students benefit from a full week of immersion into the language and culture. They attend school with their exchange partners, explore local places of interest and spend valuable time with their host family, learning about the typical way of life and honing their language skills by dealing with real-life situations in the foreign language.



Geography—Sustainability (Year 8)





Students will learn about ecosystems and sustainability as part of their studies in Year 8. This trip to The Deep in Hull will provide an excellent opportunity for students to extend their knowledge. Students will participate in workshops on plastics in our oceans and the effect it has on people and wildlife, linking with the school's focus on sustainability.

Geography Field Trips 2 (5)





It is a requirement of the GCSE Geography course that students engage in fieldwork. Students will take part in two days' worth of fieldwork by visiting Malham and Leeds City centre. This is a really exciting opportunity which allows students to bring their learning in the classroom to life!

Trips and Visits

History Trip (Year 7-8)





This is a four-day residential trip to the Ypres Salient in Belgium. During the trip, students will visit cemeteries, museums, battlefields and key sites of the First World War as well as the grave of an HGS student awarded the Victoria Cross for bravery during the war. Students will have free time in the town of Ypres before crossing back to the UK on an overnight ferry. This rewarding trip allows Year 8 students to consolidate their learning on the First World War and explore the impact that this conflict had on Europe.

History Trip (Year 10) (2) (5)





Year 10 historians will visit Durham Cathedral as part of their work on Norman England. Students will tour the cathedral to gain a deeper understanding of its significance in the Norman Conquest of England and how it fits into Norman reforms to the Church.

History Trip (Year 11) (2) (5)





Year 11 historians visit the Thackray Medical Museum in Leeds for a revision day enriching their understanding of the study of me cine through time, with a particular focus on the industrial and modern periods, through the artefacts held by the museum.

Humanities Trip (Year 7) (2) (5)





Year 7 students will visit York in a trip that compliments areas of the curriculum that have been studied through the year and helps in their studies in forthcoming academic years. This trip includes undertaking fieldwork related to their study of flooding in Geography; a visit to Clifford's Tower to consolidate their work on the Middle Ages in History and a tour of York Minster, allowing students to apply their knowledge of Christianity from RS to the magnificent Minster.



Humanities Trip to Iceland (Year 12) (2)





Year 12 Geographers have the opportunity to visit several geographical sites in Iceland. The sites chosen will enrich and enhance student understanding of the human environment, physical processes and the interactions between them. During the A-Level course, students will study the topic of Tectonic Hazards and the landforms associated with them. This trip provides students with the opportunity to see these in real life.

Outward Bound Trip (Year 9)





Year 9 students are offered the opportunity to take part in an optional outdoor residential trip. This experience is a chance to mark the end of Key Stage 3, to act as preparation for Key Stage 4 and to live out one of our core values "Adventure". The students will take part in the Outward Bound's Adventure and Challenge programme. Challenges include gorge scrambling, rock climbing, mountain walking, canoeing, raft building and cutter sailing. All are fun, adventurous and help to build confidence and develop friendships.



Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme (Year 10-13) (15)





The Duke of Edinburgh Award (D of E) is a fantastic opportunity for students to get out and engage with the community. D of E is fantastic for health and wellbeing, it develops our students communication and leadership skills and is a chance to make new friends. Students who take part in D of E always have good fun and forge lasting memories through their experiences.

In Year 10 students have the opportunity to participate in the Bronze Award, and Year 12 have the opportunity to work towards Gold. The award is made up of different key areas:

Bronze level - Physical, Skill, Volunteering and Expedition

Gold level - All of the above, plus a Residential section

Students engage in an activity for an hour a week for each of the sections for a set period of time (see graphics below). As part of the award, students will take part in a walking expedition. This is a two-day expedition in Wensleydale and Nidderdale at Bronze and a four-day expedition in The Howgill Fells and Dales at Gold. All kit can be borrowed except walking boots, sleeping bag and a waterproof jacket.

You will enjoy loads of new experiences, get fitter, challenge yourself and discover talents you never thought you had. In conclusion, the Duke of Edinburgh award is a life changing, community engaging, skill building experience.

Encore! Music Lessons







Encore! is the name of the daytime instrumental, vocal and LAMDA music teaching provision at HGS. Any student is eligible for tuition, there is no need to have had previous music lessons elsewhere, just an enthusiasm for creating music.

Our emphasis is on providing quality tuition for all year groups and all standards of students. If you have always wanted to try your hand at playing something or singing, have a go with one of our 6-week taster introductory courses with no obligation to continue. For more advanced music students, tuition is available with 40% GCSE, A level and BTEC Music discounts aimed at supporting key stage 4 and 5 music courses. Study towards external music exams or purely for enjoyment.

Tuition is offered on most instruments (Flute, Oboe, Clarinet, Bassoon, Saxophone, Trumpet, French Horn, Trombone, Euphonium, Tuba, Violin, Viola, Cello, Double Bass, Popular Music Vocals, Classical Voice, Piano, Electric Guitar, Classical Guitar, Bass Guitar, Drum Kit, Percussion, and LAMDA public speaking), by a dedicated team of specialists.

Each year the school supports a particular principal charity and the Charities Committee meet periodically to organise and support events throughout the year to raise money for the work of them.

The Charites committee comprises volunteer members from across Key Stage 3 to 5. The committee organise and run a calendar of events to fundraise for a variety of charities with the Bizarre Bazaars run by each of the school houses in December, and non-uniform days each term. There is also one big charity event each term that is organised and run by the charity committee.

House Events









Upon starting school in Year 7, students are allocated to a House; Ventus, Ignis, Terra or Aqua. The house system allows all students from Year 7 to Year 13 to feel a sense of belonging. It provides an opportunity across a broad range of activities and competitions to develop confidence and leadership skills. Every student, whatever their age, is encouraged to participate. Students develop a strong commitment to their House and teammates. At the end of the year there is a whole school assembly which celebrates the successes of the House activities and a shield is presented to the House that has accrued the greatest number of points.

Sixth Form Service Job Roles



Showing commitment and respect to the school community and beyond are values that we promote strongly at Harrogate Grammar School. To promote this, all Year 12 students are required to complete 30 hours Service over the course of the year. This Service involves students undertaking a voluntary role either in or out of school. The purpose of Service is to give our Sixth Form students responsibility for supporting others, to develop communication skills, to forge a strong sense of community, and to give younger

Sixth Form Student Ambassador

The role of Sixth Form Student Ambassador is one of significant responsibility. School Council

Senate





Students volunteer to represent their year group at Senate, and then this goes to a vote with the rest of the year group. Minutes are presented to the SLT and a summary of the meeting is written for the Bulletin. The meetings are run by the two head students.
